#### Field Work Components:

#### Field Level:

- Observational Visits The first year students during the first semester go for concurrent observational visits to various settings: Medical and Psychiatric, Rural Community Setting, Slums, Industrial Setting, Correctional setting and Child Protection settings etc.
- The students in the second semester are placed in a community setting to understand and explore the various community issues and challenges through various techniques 6 and procedures. The students are trained to apply their theoretical/Classroom understanding and knowledge in practical situations.
- In the third semester the students are placed in a social welfare agency so as to understand various aspects related to management of social welfare agency. This allows them to connect and engage with the target population through an agency as a medium. It ultimately is aimed at giving hands on training in welfare management.
- In the fourth semester the students in addition to field placement at various settings are also taken for a rural camp. This allows the students to experience the rural life better and engage and interact with the population for many days.
